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How do I sign up for the EVE Listserv?

EVE is a statewide listserv for everyone who serves blind and low vision students in Washington State.

This Listserv is open to all educators and service providers of blind and low vision children.

To subscribe, please follow the steps below:

- 1. Go to the EVE website: EVE | Washington State School for the Blind and click on Subscribe or Unsubscribe.
- 2. You will receive a confirmation email from the listserv. Be sure to respond to confirm your subscription.

How do I order materials for my students?

Many materials we use for our students with blindness and low vision, such as Perkins Braillers, paper, technology, etc., are available at no charge to school districts. Items like Braillers and technology are available on loan (non-consumable) while many other items never need to be returned (consumable).

Districts need to have an account with the **Ogden Resource Center (ORC)** in order to access materials. A description of the ORC is here: <u>Ogden Resource Center | Washington State School for the Blind</u>

- 1. The district must have an account holder: The Account Holder is often the Special Education Director or Administrative Assistant. The form to set up an account or change the account holder is here:
 AccountHolderRegistrationForm.docx (live.com)
- 2. **Students must be registered:** Parent permission is required before a student can be registered.
 - Parent permission must have a signature (not typed) on the following form <u>ParentPermission.docx (live.com)</u> which can be emailed to <u>irc@wssb.wa.gov</u> for processing or mailed to the ORC. An electronic signature form is available at https://tinyurl.com/ORCParentPermission. The form is available in many languages here: Ogden Resource Center <u>Washington State School for the Blind</u>
 - Once the ORC receives a parent permission form, they will add the student to the account. The account holder or designee will then fill in the rest of the student information.
- 3. *Ordering materials in ORC Online*: Materials need to be ordered under a student name. Searching in ORC Online includes several options. The catalog number search works well if you put in the middle part of the catalog number, for example, type 1947 to search for catalog #B-A1947-00. Also, when searching ISBN numbers, remove all dashes. ORC Online: Orc (wa.gov)



- 4. What materials are available? Materials available can be browsed in the APH catalog. Most (but not all) of these items are available through the ORC. The catalog numbers listed in the catalog are how you can search for materials in ORC online.

How do I access Large Print, Digital, Braille and Audio books for my students?

Bookshare: Bookshare offers digital books to qualifying students. Books can be read through audio or customizable large print.

Washington Talking Book and Braille Library (WTBBL): The WTBBL provides books in Braille on loan through the mail. Audiobooks are available through the mail on a cartridge that works with a special player, or through downloads in the BARD app.

How does the Washington State School for the Blind (WSSB) work?

On-campus program for students in grade 6-12: WSSB offers both day and residential student services. Students who live within 45 miles or one hour from the school will reside at home and are day students. Parents wishing to enroll their child as a resident student may request such placement through the IEP process as part of the need for more intensive residential services. https://irwin.wssb.wa.gov/

Short Courses: Available to students state-wide, short programs through WSSB for B/LV students. Some programs will be in person and on campus and others will be online.
